Message from our President

It has been an absolute pleasure to work with Bette Blance and Susan Fleming this past year as we 'pooled our knowledge and understanding' to create documents we believe will help schools know what co-verifiers could see in a school that wants to be declared as a Glasser Quality School. Creating those documents with Bette and Susan was a wonderful experience and I hope the documents we have created are useful. Working with these two amazing educators also gave me the opportunity to 'cement' in my mind what a Glasser Quality School is.

When Aminta Miller, Bette and I visited Mudgeeraba State Special School in September we very quickly realised how hard the school community had worked to learn Choice Theory/Reality Therapy/Lead Management and the outstanding job they had done to implement Dr Glasser's ideas into their community. The staff had found very creative ways to teach Choice Theory to the children, which was a delight to witness.

I have just come back from visiting Sunshine Beach State School who, I am also delighted to say, easily demonstrated what a Glasser Quality School looks like, sounds like and, just as importantly, feels like. Sunshine Beach was the first Glasser Quality School in Australia and was actually co-verified by Dr Glasser himself on one of his visits to Australia. What a wonderful experience that must have been. Susan Fleming and I were 'on site' during the 2-day re-co-verification process and Bette Blance was able to 'zoom' in from her home in Morrinsville, New Zealand. The three of us were able to see how hard the school community had worked to implement Dr Glasser's ideas and experience the joyful community that is Sunshine Beach State School. Being involved in my second co-verification of a Glasser Quality School in as many months and creating policy and procedure documents has been a steep learning curve for me. I've certainly added some more pictures to my Quality World and urge any school that is interested in finding out what being declared as a Glasser Quality School here in Australia involves to get in touch, so we can 'share our pictures'. I'd also encourage anyone who believes they have the skills and knowledge to become part of a co-verifying team to contact me as I know there are many schools in Australia that could declare themselves as a Glasser Quality School.
